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<u>Headmaster Letter</u>

Dear Archway Family and Friends,

"On the farm we work together, and we play together" I often heard my father state. He could have easily added, "And we learn together." Not until later in life did I realize the lessons learned working in the field and playing in the barn. During humid summer Iowa days, my ten-year-old farm boy self would frequently walk beans. (For those urbanites, walking beans is really a euphemism for pulling weeds.) Dressed in my overalls and donned with a seed corn cap, I would walk half-mile row after half-mile row of soybeans pulling velvet leaf, milkweed, and hemp dogbane. The work was wearying, sweaty, and monotonous. I am not sure I fully grasped the agricultural benefit derived by pulling nuisance weeds out of the unforgiving soil. At times I imagined that this task was invented by my dad solely as a means to get me out of the house and away from my beloved baseball cards.

But I was learning. I became a student of perseverance and determination. Without the artificial aid of electronics, my constant companion in the field was creativity. In my mind the weeds were dangerous enemies, and I, the hero, vanquished the foes and rescued the field and my family from impending peril. I learned the lesson of satisfaction. While riding my bicycle along the gravel roads, I noticed neighboring fields littered with weeds so that one could scarcely determine what crops grew there. Then I observed rows free from weeds, clean and straight, and I knew that what I was beholding was directly a result of my effort. On the south side of the barn hung a wooden backboard and an orange metal rim. The concrete was anything but smooth, and in the winter time I shoveled snow to clear enough space to dribble. It was there I learned to play basketball. My basketball companions consisted of an older brother, an older cousin, and my dad. All of them were taller than me, stronger than me, and more skilled than me. And did I mention competitive? They blocked my shots, so I had to develop a quick release to have any prayer of hoisting a shot. They stole my passes, so I had to develop pinpoint precision to hit my intended target. They knew I was right-handed, so they defended my right side, forcing me to develop my left hand to such a degree that I still dribble predominantly with my left hand. Most of the time whomever had me for a teammate lost.

But I was learning. I learned how to lose graciously. I also wanted to learn how to win. I spent hours by myself shooting and dribbling, dribbling and shooting. Naturally I grew taller and became stronger. The skills that I learned when I was short and weak remained with me as I grew into an adolescent and eventually an adult. I learned that the very thing that frustrated me as a boy aided my athletic development and deepened my love for the game. And occasionally I win. Good things are seldom easy. I'm reminded of a passage that I read recently in Charlotte Mason's "A Philosophy of Education."

School, perhaps, offers fewer opportunities for vitiating the atmosphere than does home life. But teaching may be so watered down and sweetened, teachers may be so suave and condescending, as to bring about a condition of intellectual feebleness and moral softness which it is not easy for a child to overcome. The bracing atmosphere of truth and sincerity should be perceived in every school; and here again the common pursuit of knowledge by teacher and class comes to our aid and creates a current of fresh air perceptible even to the chance visitor, who sees the glow of intellectual life and moral health on the faces of teachers and children alike.

That glow is what we aim to achieve at Archway North Phoenix. It is seldom easy, but it is always good.

Tutoring

As we reach the halfway point of first quarter, you may be hearing from your scholar's teacher regarding the opportunity for tutoring. In an effort to make the tutoring sessions as effective as possible, we will be limiting the number of students involved in a given tutoring session. We believe that these smaller groups will allow for more direct instruction and will provide a greater benefit to the students. Logistically, this may mean fewer tutoring sessions for a given student, but the sessions that are offered will hopefully have a greater impact.

Tutoring will be only by the teacher's invitation, and the day and time will be communicated by the teacher at least 72 hours in advance. Students will be escorted to the north side of the K-4 building where teachers will wait with students for parents to pick up their students following tutoring. If you accept the invitation for a tutoring session, please pick up your student at the stated conclusion time of the session. A late charge of \$1/minute will be assessed for late pick-up.

In some cases, a student may need more extensive help than what can adequately be provided by the homeroom teacher. A list of available tutors will be available on the website by the end of the week. You are welcome to reach out to one of our ANP teachers who offers tutoring during the course of the school year. Individual arrangements for tutoring frequency and rates can be made directly with that teacher.



<u>NEW Birthday Policy</u>

The new school policy is that birthday treats, toys, goodies, or "thank you" notes may NOT be distributed at school by parents, students, or teachers. Invitations may be distributed at school as long as the entire class is invited or if all the boys or all the girls of a class are invited. If invitations are not inclusive as indicated, then invitations will not be distributed. Students may choose to purchase a book from the school's "wish list" (archwaynorthphoenix.greatheartsacademies.org click on Academics tab, Literature Reading Lists, and the appropriate grade level) to donate to the school library in honor of their birthday. A parent may arrange to read the book with the birthday student in front of the class. <u>Dress Code</u>

After a two-week grace period during which warnings were communicated and emails were sent home, on Monday, August 20, uniform infractions began being issued for students out of dress code. If a student receives a total of three infractions within a thirty-day period or five infractions within a quarter, they are required to serve a detention.
